<b>Key achievements to date – July 2025:</b>	<b>Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:</b>
<p>85% of Year 6 cohort can swim confidently and competently over 25m. Each class received a minimum of 120 hours of additional PE during 2024/2025. KS1 have received additional multi-skills teaching and KS2 have received additional small-sided games teaching. 94 children participated in Bikeability training during 24/25 – balance bikes, bike maintenance and cycling proficiency. New clubs introduced from external providers such as street dance and judo.
