Privacy Notice - How we use pupil information

The school collects and uses personal information (referred to in the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) as personal data) about staff, pupils, parents and other individuals who come into contact with the school. This information is gathered in order to enable the provision of education and other associated functions. In addition, the school may be required by law to collect, use and share certain information.

The categories of pupil information that we process includes:

- personal identifiers and contacts (such as name, unique pupil number, contact details and address)
- characteristics (such as faith, ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility)
- safeguarding information (such as court orders and professional involvement, names and contact details of adults authorised to collect each child)
- special educational needs (such as professional reports and assessments)
- medical and administration (such as doctors information, child health, dental health, allergies, medication and dietary requirements)
- attendance (such as sessions attended, number of absences, absence reasons and any previous schools attended)
- assessment and attainment (such as Reception Baseline results, key stage 1 and phonics results, multiplication test check results)
- modes of travel
- behavioural information (such as exclusions, any relevant alternative provision put in place, involvement of other professionals or agencies)
- mental health and wellbeing information (such as professional reports and assessments)
- photographs and digital recordings of pupils

This list is not exhaustive.

Why we collect pupil information

We collect and use personal information:

- to support pupil learning
- to monitor and report on pupil progress
- to provide appropriate pastoral care
- to assess the quality of our services and how well our school is doing
- statistical forecasting and planning
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing
- for the purposes of educational research

The General Data Protection Regulation allows us to collect and use pupil information with consent of the data subject, where we are complying with a legal requirement, where processing is necessary to protect the vital interests of a data subject or another person and where processing is necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in the controller. When the personal information is Special Category Information we may rely on processing being in the substantial public interest in addition to consent of the data subject and the vital interests of the data subject or another. Our requirement for this data and our legal basis for processing this data includes the Education Act 1996, 2002 and 2011, The Children's Act 1989 and 2004, Education and Skills Act 2008, Schools Standards and Framework Act 1998 and the Equalities Act 2010.

The following is a list of the lawful reasons ([from Article 6, GDPR](#)) which enable us to collect data:

- Necessary for the compliance with a legal obligation
- Necessary to protect the vital interests of the data subject
- Necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest
- The data subject has given consent to the processing
- Necessary for the performance of a contract with the data subject

In addition, concerning any special category data, lawful reasons from [Article 9](#), GDPR:

- Necessary for establishing, exercising or defending legal rights
- Necessary for reasons of substantial public interest
- Necessary and authorised by law for employment obligations

- Necessary to protect the vital interests of the data subject and consent is not feasible

Collecting pupil information

We request and collect pupil information via:

- registration forms at the start of the school year
- Common Transfer File (CTF) or secure file transfer from previous school
- Contact with other professionals or agencies throughout the school year as necessary

Pupil data is essential for the schools' operational use. Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it requested on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the data protection legislation, we will inform you at the point of collection, whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this.

Storing pupil data

We hold pupil data for / in accordance with our retention schedule. Information about this can be found by asking at the school office.

Who we share pupil information with

We routinely share pupil information with:

- schools that the pupils attend after leaving us
- our local authority
- Catholic Academies and Schools Office (CASO), Portsmouth Diocese
- the Department for Education (DfE)
- Children's Services
- Learning Platforms (such as Seesaw, Accelerated Reader, Spelling Shed)
- Researchers from reputable institutions

Why we regularly share pupil information

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share pupils' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring. We are required to share information about our pupils with our local authority (LA) and the Department for Education (DfE) under section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact the school's Data Protection Officer – Tina Hawkins, 01264 361 806.

You also have the right to:

- ask us for access to information about you that we hold
- have your personal data rectified, if it is inaccurate or incomplete
- request the deletion or removal of personal data where there is no compelling reason for its continued processing
- restrict our processing of your personal data (i.e. permitting its storage but no further processing)
- object to direct marketing (including profiling) and processing for the purposes of scientific/historical research and statistics
- not to be subject to decisions based purely on automated processing where it produces a legal or similarly significant effect on you

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

Much of the data about pupils in England goes on to be held in the National Pupil Database (NPD).

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education (DfE) and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department for Education (DfE).

It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law, to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census and early years' census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

The law allows the Department for Education (DfE) to share pupils' personal data with certain third parties, including:

- schools and local authorities
- researchers
- organisations connected with promoting the education or wellbeing of children in England
- other government departments and agencies
- organisations fighting or identifying crime

How to find out what personal information the Department of Education (DFE) holds about you

Under the terms of the [Data Protection Act 2018](#), you are entitled to ask the Department for Education (DfE):

- if they are processing your personal data
- for a description of the data they hold about you
- the reasons they're holding it and any recipient it may be disclosed to
- for a copy of your personal data and any details of its source
